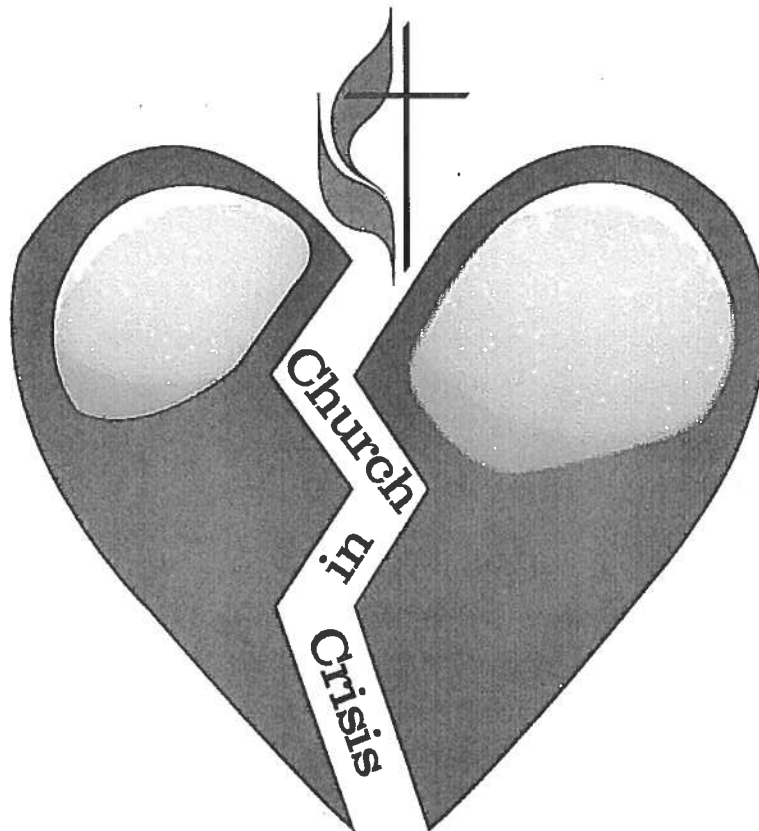

From our pastor.....

“The first Sunday school room at Whitney United Methodist Church was in the living room of a house on the corner of Overland and Gurley Street in 1941. Mrs. Harry Strong was appointed to act as the Sunday School Superintendent and to organize a Bible Study class. She moved to Arkansas to join her husband called into active duty. So Mrs. Henry Matlock (Iva) was appointed General Superintendent of the Sunday School in 1942 and Mrs. Fred J. Allen (Jessie) was appointed Superintendent of the beginners department. As good news of a Sunday School on the Whitney Bench was spread, people began to send their children. The church school grew so rapidly that it was decided to enlarge the cottage and an addition was built. But even this addition was not enough and a new church building was deemed essential.

Dr. Charles Donaldson was appointed to Whitney in 1946 and assigned to take charge of the development of a religious center on the Whitney Bench. At the time that he took over as Pastor, there was no church building, few means to finance the enterprise and only a few members (36) to carry the load.

And yet, a new church sanctuary was built and opened in 1948 and God’s hand was apparent in every phase of the building. Memorial gifts, gifts from leading firms in the city, and small gifts from the children all helped in the completion of the enterprise. Many people gave to make it possible for the church to be built. It is hoped that this spirit will brighten our years to come and the generations that follow.”

This history of the beginning of Whitney United Methodist church is from “Whitney United Methodist Church First 50 Years” written by Dorothy J. Borger (a member of Whitney UMC who died a few years ago.)

I love her telling of this story of where the church came from. This church felt a call to reach the children and families of our neighborhood even though there were not a lot of church members or a lot of money to do so. But there was a sense that God was calling them to reach these children and families and they trusted God’s hand to help it happen.

It is 78 years since that first call on this church to reach children and families and God is still calling us to share God’s love and grace with the children and families in our neighborhood.

And we are facing the same challenge those 36 church members faced--- lack of space. While we have a church building, we are rapidly running out of room. The Sunday school room we have for the kids is not big enough for the kids we have and certainly does not have room for growth. The adult Sunday school class has outgrown it’s room. On most Sundays, the parking lot is full and even the Sanctuary does not have too much more room for growth.

In order to reach new children and families as we feel God is calling us, we need to have the space for them to feel like there is room for them.

So in this last year, the church council and the finance team have been studying our space needs, the potential for growth and the needs of our community. Through this study, it has been clear that we, as a church, need to make plans for the future. These plans need to include a short term solution as well as long term dreams.

So we have been working on just that. A group of church folk met this spring to brainstorm some short term solutions. We had an all church meeting on June 23 to present the needs to the congregation. We have procured the work of Rev. Larry Abell who is an architect in our Annual Conference who works with churches. And on August 18, we had a church conference where we voted to “consider a building or remodeling project at Whitney UMC to address our lack of space as outlined by the study committee.”

We also approved a building committee to pursue this project. That committee includes Bert Allen, Shelley Cooper, Malcom Dunten, Miriam Fridel, and Gena Waller. There is room for another person or two on this committee so if you feel God calling you to be a part of this committee—please see Rev. Christina.

But we do recognize that a remodeling or building project does take funds to make it happen. So we have also established a Stewardship Ministry Team to look at ways to raise the funds for what God is calling us to do. This Team includes Nick Alexander, Shelley Cooper, David Hawk, Maran O’Meara, Ramona Walhof, Gena Waller and Rev. Christina.

I can only imagine what those 36 original members of this church were thinking when they took steps of faith to build a building. There had to be a lot of doubt—“There are not enough of us. We can’t afford this? Will it work? What if it fails?” And yet, I can also hear their words of faith “God is a God of abundance. There is enough to make this happen. What great dreams is God calling us to?”

I have similar doubts and similar words of faith. I know that the God who called this church to reach out to children and families in the unknown years of WWII, is still the God who is calling us to continue that mission today. And I know that the hand of God that was apparent in every phase of the first building of this church, is still very much apparent in what is happening here at Whitney UMC now. I have no idea exactly what this building project will end up looking like, although I do promise that we will be fiscally responsible in building. But I do know that God is actively at work and when this project is all over, we will be amazed at what God did through us. And I know that Iva Matlock, Jessie Allen and Mrs. Harry Strong, and all of the rest of the original 36 members of this church are cheering us on.

Minutes from the Whitney UMC All Church Conference

August 18, 2019

Moderator: Rev. Jane Shaffer. There were 40 members attending.

Rev. Christina stated that the purpose of the meeting was that over the last couple of years it has become clear that the church is outgrowing its available space particularly in the classroom and storage areas. The Finance Committee recognized the need and commissioned a study committee who did an analysis of those needs. They determined it was time to begin looking at doing something either by remodeling existing space and/or building a new building.

Question #1 – ORIGINAL MOTION: *Motion to authorize a building/remodeling project at Whitney UMC to address our lack of space as outlined by the study committee.*

Motion made: Rev. Christina Thompson, **Seconded by:** Bert Allen.

Call to amend original motion: Carla Biersdorff

AMENDED MOTION: *Motion to **consider** a building or remodeling project at Whitney UMC to address our lack of space as outlined by the study committee.*

Amended motion seconded: Dave Hawks. **Amended motion carried**

Question #2 – We elect a building committee to serve in the development of this project.

a. Shelly Cooper b. Malcom Dunten c. Gena Waller d. Miriam Fridel – youth rep e. Bert Allen.

Motion carried

The building committee is tasked to use information from the study committee and all relevant info made available; to estimate carefully the building facilities needed; to develop a preliminary architectural plan that includes city and building codes; to develop a financial plan that includes all estimated costs of the project, the projected funding from church members and other sources and the amount to be financed and to work in conjunction with the stewardship Committee in securing those funds.

The Stewardship Ministry Team members: (This did not require a vote)

Ramona Walhof, Gena Waller, David Hawk, Maran O'Meara, Shelley Cooper, Rev. Christina Thompson.

It was suggested that the Council make available the results and standings of the commitments made under the Vision and Mission statement developed four years ago in terms of attendance, in terms of need and other things. That people are more willing to financially support the project if the church can show that goals have been achieved and that the church is continuing to move forward.

Rev. Jane closed the meeting by encouraging each member to listen carefully to where God is calling them and to listen carefully to God's guidance thru others.

The blankets can be **quilted, knitted, crocheted or made (tied) from fleece.**

45" x 45"

45" x 60"

or 56" x 84" for a twin bed

Glenna became activity Director for Capital Care Nursing Home.

A neighbor introduced Glenna and Jake Finley, and they were married December 5, 1992. They took their honeymoon for a month in Europe, and Glenna retired.

Jake grew up in La Grande OR. After high school, he joined the Navy and was sent to Korea. He and his first wife had a son and a daughter, Jeff and Melissa, and Jake has 5 grandchildren. One of his granddaughters Chennell is now a sophomore at BSU and keeps in close touch with her grandpa and Glenna. She lived with them during her senior year of high school.

Jake worked as a machinist in La Grande and on the maintenance crew for state buildings in Idaho. He helped with Boy Scouts at Lowell Grade school and at Whitney Church. He was a long-time member of the Methodist men when it was a large group, and he helped with Friday night dinners. Jake also worked with the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) and served as President for some time.

Before I asked Jake any questions, he said, "I love the church, and I love God. I want to help where ever I can."

Glenna has a son in Utah, and a grandson in Hawaii. Her youngest son, Jerry and his wife, live in Ecuador and are active with the Jehovah's Witnesses. He calls his mother at least once a week. Her oldest son John and his son William live in Boise and are a lot of help to the Finleys now. William has 8 children. Glenna says "They're all different, and you just hear more from some than others."

Glenna says it is harder now to get around, but they are looking forward to tuning in to the Whitney Sunday morning services on the radio.

For your Reflection
CrossOver reflection for Week 37 *We Make the Road by Walking*, Chapter 50
Rev. Deena Wolfe

My heart sank when I heard those words. My dad had been declining for two years, but I was not ready for the reality of what those words meant. I felt both fear and sadness, and I knew that his days on this earth were short. I was preparing to begin work as a hospice chaplain, and over the next 3 ½ weeks, orientation became personal.

“It’s time to consider hospice.” For ten days we sat in vigil for him, and a little over four years ago he stepped off this earth and into glory. It was a beautiful and very emotional time as we went from brief moments of conversation together to him slipping into a coma and then taking his last breath.

This experience has enriched my ministry as a grief counselor and hospice chaplain with deep empathy for those who hear the word “hospice.” The reality of death is now staring you in the face. Our culture does not give fertile ground to the discussion of life and death and the grief that comes along with it.

Everything in this world is moving from birth to death. People die, relationships end, corporations go out of business, churches close. How do we move from a place of paralyzing fear to embracing the possibilities that come with the death of something or someone we love?

As people, it is natural to feel fear of the unknown. When my dad was dying, he suddenly opened his eyes wide and said, “Wow.... mom’s going to be shocked!” He saw something on the other side which we couldn’t see, something which was amazing and beautiful. He was unable to share with us what he was seeing, but the joy and wonder on his face were unmistakable. They brought great comfort as we mourned this time of separation. The picture above was taken by my brother, the evening before dad died. For us, this was dad’s angel, coming to guide him home.

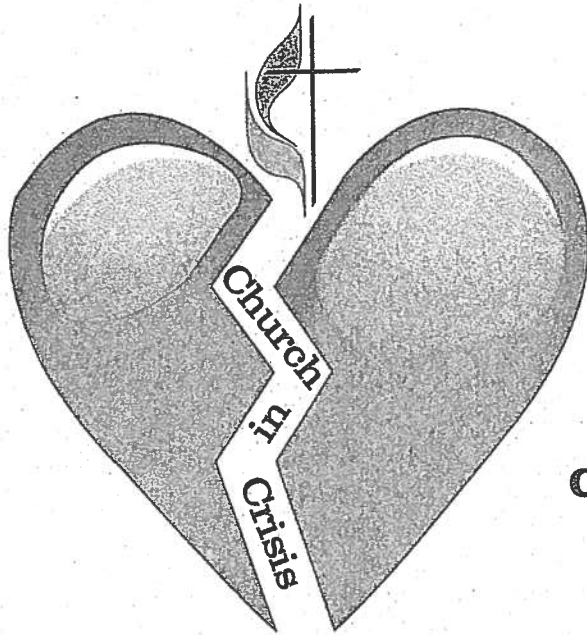
In this week’s chapter of *We Make the Road By Walking*, Brian McLaren writes: “As we walk this road, we not only remember the past, we also anticipate the future, which is described as a great banquet around God’s table of joy. When you pass from this life, do not be afraid. You will not pass into death. You will pass through death into a greater aliveness still – the banquet of God. Trust God, and live.”

This principle applies to relationships with the people that we love but also has great meaning with all the uncertainties we see in the church today. For there to be new life, death must occur. God is with us in every part of our lives, from celebrating the birth of a new life, or a new ministry, to mourning with us in the pain and sorrow that occurs when a ministry ends, or someone dies.

We are invited to embrace “hospice” moments in our everyday lives. Hospice provides supportive relationships, individuals walking together, shepherding the person and their family members on the road from life to death. We trust that the Spirit who brings us life will lead and guide us through these times of uncertainty into a place of deeper relationship.

Part of our Wesleyan heritage is the value of the experiences we have in our lives. Whether an experience is filled with joy or sorrow, or birth or death, there is something valuable to be gained, a piece of wisdom to be pondered for use later. May we take great comfort that our triune God—Creator, Christ, Comforter is living and active in our lives—from before birth to after death.

Nurturing Generous Living Thoughts about generosity from Discipleship Ministries of the United Methodist Church



Generosity is a matter of action, intentions, and heart. One way to describe it is the grateful outpouring of gifts to others, out of our love for God. *Outpouring* is a terrific description, since the priceless treasure of the gospel (and all the gifts of covenant, relationship, and life that go with it) comes from God and is meant to be poured out, through our living, upon others. Paul states this directly in 2 Corinthians 4:5-7, when he says, "We have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us."

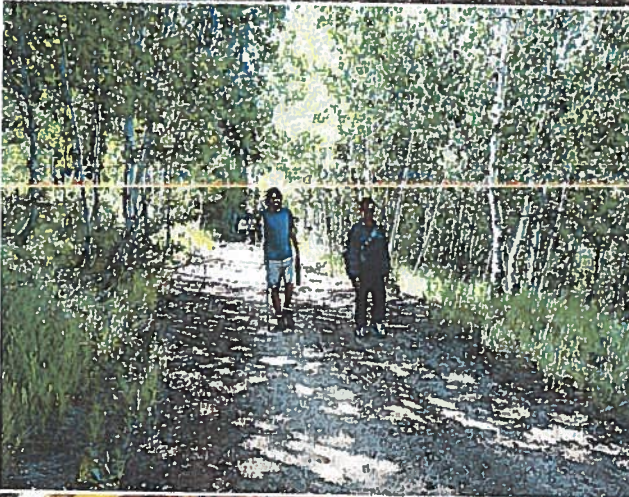
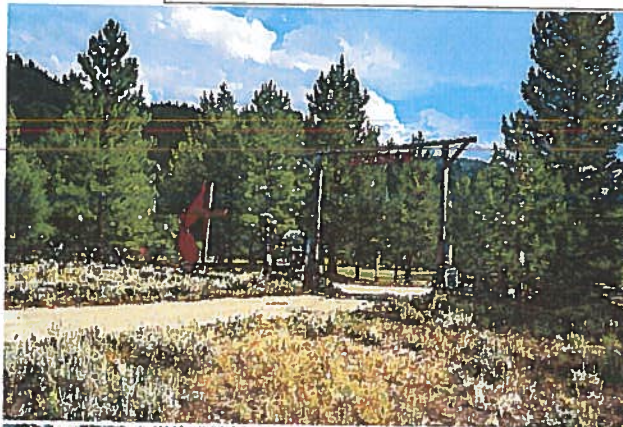
Whether for fancy purposes or everyday usage, the "unadorned pots of our daily lives" (as *The Message* puts it) highlight the fact that **all of who we are and what we have comes from God** and is to be used for God's purposes. God can use our uniqueness, even our limitations, weaknesses and eccentricities, to communicate God's powerful presence and love.

Generous living is not just about giving money, or even just about giving. It has to do with **the whole of who we are and how we care for our neighbors** (see Mark 12:28-31). Each of us brings our heart, mind, soul, and strength. The Old Testament word for "heart" is literally the leaning or thrust of our lives. We might call it our lifestyle or nonverbal witness. In other words, it is how we steward 100 percent of our lives, not just the "religious" sector or the percentage we give away.

So how do we lead stewardship in our local church? By nurturing generous living in our personal lives and in our life together as part of our congregation and Christ's interconnected, connectional church.

Nurturing generous living in every aspect of our life together before God -- now that's great stewardship.
